

Waquar Ahmed grew up in the slums of Kolkata, India. Currently, he is Associate Professor of Geography at the University of North Texas in Denton, where he has taught since 2012. He has served on the editorial board of *RRPE* since 2016. Since January of 2019, he has been the editor of *Human Geography: A New Radical Journal*. His life experience of living in the midst of poverty, (minority) marginalization, ghettoization, and police violence informs his radical scholarship. He has published primarily in the areas of neoliberalism, FDI, neo-imperialism, class and caste contradictions, development, social movements, and state theory and power. His work has appeared among other places in the *RRPE*, *Annals of the Association of American Geographers*, *Antipode*, and *ACME: International E-Journal of Critical Geographies*. He co-edited *India's New Economic Policy: A Critical Analysis* (Routledge 2011), and has contributed book chapters to several peer-reviewed volumes. Waquar holds a Ph.D. in Geography from Clark University in Worcester, MA. He also holds an M.Phil and Master's in Geography from the Center for the Study of Regional Development at Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi, and a Bachelor's in Commerce from St. Xavier's College, Kolkata. He has served on the editorial boards of *Capitalism Nature Socialism* and *ACME: An International Journal for Critical Geographies*. He would greatly love to continue serving on the *RRPE* editorial board and collaborate with other board members in the development and transmission of scholarship centered on critical and radical political economy.

Fletcher Baragar has been a reader and subscriber of the *RRPE* since his graduate student days. He has served on the *Review's* editorial board since 2010, and has served as *RRPE's* Book Review Editor since January 2018. The *Review's* pluralistic approach to critical political economy reflects his own deeply held beliefs about what is essential for progressive scholarship and for the critical inquiry that is indispensable in a democratic society. As a member of the editorial board, he endeavors to facilitate and support the scholarly work that embodies these values. He holds the rank of Associate Professor in the Department of Economics at the University of Manitoba, and also serves as Associate Head (Economics and Society) of the Department. His research interests concern Marxian economics, macroeconomics, history of economic thought, and the Canadian economy. He has been on the Steering Committee for the Progressive Economics Forum since 2000, and served as PEF Chair (2002–2006). From 2003 to 2011, he served on the Board of Directors of the Canadian Centre for Policy Alternatives-Manitoba, and, for 2006–2011, served as CCPA-MB Chair. Since 2017, he has also been a member of the Editorial Board for *Studies in Political Economy*.

Davide Gualerzi received his doctorate from the Graduate Faculty of the New School for Social Research in 1991 and now serves as Associate Professor of Economics at the University of Padua. His research interests are in the fields of macroeconomic theory and policy, structural change, technical progress, and consumption dynamics. He has also kept up with early interests in local and regional development and planning. His work has appeared in the *Review of Radical Political Economics*, the *Review of Political Economy*, *History of Economic Ideas*, and *Structural Change & Economic Dynamics*. His second book, published with Routledge in 2010, is *The Coming of Age of Information Technologies and the Path of Transformational Growth*. An edited volume, co-edited with Claudia Sunna, was also published with Routledge in 2016, *Development Economics in the XXI Century*. Davide would be pleased to continue serving as a member of the *RRPE* editorial board and contributing to the *RRPE's* vibrant tradition of critical inquiry, an outlook that was a crucial factor in his decision to become an economist. He also looks forward to continuing his collaboration with fellow Board members, with whom he shares a vision of economics as a tool for progressive change.

Elif Karacimen received her Ph.D. in Economics from the School of Oriental and African Studies. She is Assistant Professor of Economics at the University of Recep Tayyip Erdogan, Turkey. Her research interests include the political economy of finance, financialization in emerging capitalist economies, household debt, development economics, and the Turkish economy. She is currently working on financialization of non-financial corporations and financialization of housing. She has published articles in the *Cambridge Journal of Economics*, *Review of Radical Political Economics*, *Journal of Balkan and Eastern Studies*, and *Journal of Housing and Built Environment*. She has been manuscript reviewer for a variety of journals including *Review of Radical Political Economics* as well as *Cambridge Journal of Economics*, *Journal of Balkan and Near Eastern Studies*, *Competition and Change*, and *New Political Economy*. Elif would love the opportunity to continue to serve on the *RRPE* editorial board, work with others who share mutual goals, and contribute to the development of political economy.

Michael Keaney seeks re-election to the editorial board for what would be his sixth term, pledging to continue supporting a pluralistic editorial line that encompasses a broad range of critical scholarship that advances our understanding of actually existing capitalism in all its various forms. Michael sees *RRPE* as a tremendously important interdisciplinary multi-perspectival forum with a global reach, providing a much-needed platform for exploratory social inquiry and analysis. This wide remit is of particular relevance at a time when the institutions of Pax Americana globally, and those of the US constitution and national security apparatus more specifically, are politicized to a degree not seen for over a generation. The inadequacies of what has been the conventional wisdom have never been more evident. His research interests include global political economy (specifically, the revival of great power rivalry and its impact on Europe and Africa), financialization, and corporate governance (the corporation as contested terrain). He is an active trade union member, engaged in collective struggle against general austerity cuts and more particular manifestations of stupidity masquerading as managerial competence.

Marlene Kim has served on the *RRPE* Editorial Board since 2007 and would be honored to be re-elected. She has enjoyed working with the Board and on the Journal and believes that the Journal provides a crucial voice in publishing and articulating aspects of political economy to a worldwide audience. To this end, she took the lead in the *RRPE* Special issue of "URPE at 50," published in the fall of 2018, including interviewing many of the people who founded or otherwise were involved in URPE. She is a two-time award winner of the Golden Pencil Award, which is awarded to an *RRPE* Board member who has contributed the most to the Journal above and beyond editorial duties: once in 2010, and again in 2018 for her work on the "URPE at 50" special issue. She has served on various subcommittees of the *RRPE*, including most recently the subcommittee on data sharing policies. Marlene is Professor of Economics at the University of Massachusetts, Boston and is also the President of the Faculty Staff Union there, representing 1000 faculty and staff. She received her undergraduate and graduate degree in Economics at UC Berkeley and was active in the URPE chapter there. She also currently serves on the Editorial Boards of three other journals: *Industrial Relations*, *Feminist Economics*, and *Panoeconomicus*, and was Guest Editor for the *Eastern Economics Journal*. She has refereed for numerous other journals including *Social Science Quarterly*, *Journal of Economic Issues*, *Policy Studies Journal*, *Contemporary Economic Policy*, *Review of Social Economy*, *Race and Social Problems*, and the *Review of Black Political Economy*. Her research spans issues of race, gender, class, and work, including unions, race and gender disparities, intersectionality, and the working poor. She also teaches popular economics to community groups. She is editor of *Race and Economic Opportunity in the Twenty-First Century* (Routledge 2007), and has published articles on these issues in numerous scholarly journals.

Mark Klinedinst has served on the *RRPE* Editorial Board for six years and has enjoyed the insights and collegiality of the other members. He worked on the URPE 50th anniversary special issue, and enjoyed looking at the solid contributions the organization has made to progressive causes. Currently Emeritus Professor of Economics at the University of Southern Mississippi, he received his Ph.D. from Cornell University in 1987. Mark has worked on international projects with funding from groups such as the National Science Foundation, Filene Research Institute, the World Bank, the United Nations, and the International Labor Organization, and acts as reviewer for a number of economics journals. He has published in the *European Economic Review*, *Journal of Comparative Economics*, *Journal of Economic Issues*, and a number of other outlets. He has taught money and banking, macroeconomics, economic development, and related courses. Mark has volunteered with a number of organizations including Head Start, Big Brother, Habitat for Humanity, Gaining Ground Sustainability Institute of Mississippi, farmers' cooperatives, and farmers' markets.

David Kotz has served on the *RRPE* Editorial Board several times since the 1970s and rejoined again in 2016. He would like to contribute to maintaining *RRPE* as a journal that publishes high-quality articles on a wide variety of topics in radical political economics, aimed at a broad audience of interested people in academia and elsewhere. As a reviewer of submissions, he evaluates a paper by determining whether the author(s) did a good job of writing the paper they sought to write. That is, he does not impose his own views about what kind of article he might write on a topic. As long as the paper falls into the category of radical political economics broadly defined, he takes the authors' project as given and evaluates whether they carried it out effectively. A wide variety of theoretical and empirical methodologies should be considered acceptable for *RRPE*. His field interests include Marxist political economy, accumulation and crisis, institutional change and economic performance, socialist economies, and transitions between socioeconomic systems.

Robert McMaster is Professor of Political Economy in the Adam Smith Business School at the University of Glasgow, Scotland. He joined Glasgow in 2007 as Senior Lecturer. Prior to this he was Teaching Fellow, Lecturer, and Senior Lecturer in the Department of Economics and the Business School at the University of Aberdeen, Scotland. He holds an undergraduate degree and Ph.D. in Economics from the University of Strathclyde. He has published in the areas of health care provision, ownership and privatization, care, evolutionary political economy and methodology, and community gardening, among others. With John Davis, he co-authored *Health Care Economics* (Routledge 2017), and in 2016 with Wilfred Dolfsma, Deb Figart, Ellen Mutari, and Mark White, he co-edited the four volume *Social Economics* (Routledge Critical Concepts in Economics series). He has over seventy academic publications, having published in journals, such as: *American Journal of Economics and Sociology*, *American Journal of Public Health*, *Annals of Public and Co-operative Economics*, *Antipode*, *British Journal of Management*, *Cambridge Journal of Economics*, *Economic Geography*, *Economy and Society*, *Fiscal Studies*, *Health Care Analysis*, *Journal of Business Ethics*, *Journal of Economic Issues*, *Journal of Institutional Economics*, *Review of Radical Political Economics*, *Review of Social Economy*, among others. He was a co-editor of the *Review of Social Economy* from 2005–17, guest edited a Special issue of the *Review of Social Economy* on Health Reform in 2002, and served on the Editorial Board of the *Journal of Economic Issues* from 2009–12. Robert organized the 2012 World Congress in Social Economics and the 2016 Association for Heterodox Economics Conference at the University of Glasgow. Together with colleagues at Glasgow and Nottingham Trent University, he is currently working on an economic democracy index. Robert believes he has the experience to contribute to the work of the Editorial Board of the *RRPE*.

Andrew Mearman is Associate Professor of Economics and Director of Student Education for the Economics Division of Leeds University, UK, having previously taught at University of Lincoln (UK), Wagner College (New York), and University of the West of England. He has also held visiting research positions at the New School, University of Amsterdam, and Leeds University, where he earned his Ph.D. and Master's degrees. His main areas of research are the nature of heterodox economics, the teaching of economics, economic methodology and research methods, and economics of the environment. This work has been published widely, including in the *Cambridge Journal of Economics*, *Oxford Economic Papers*, the *RRPE*, *Review of Social Economy*, *Metroeconomica*, and *Capital and Class*, as well as in several peer-reviewed books. His most recent work includes critiques of recent revisions to economics curricula, and a book of interviews with leading scholars on the nature of heterodox economics. He has considerable editorial experience, having acted as a referee for a number of journals and publishers, and is currently a member of the editorial board for the *Review of Political Economy*, *International Journal of Pluralism and Economics Education*, and the *Journal of Philosophical Economics*; he is also a Trustee of the Association for Social Economics. Andrew would be delighted to continue to serve on the *RRPE* Editorial Board. He is particularly eager to see even more material in the Journal on radical approaches on economics teaching, economics and ecology, and economic methodology.

Kirstin Munro is Assistant Professor of Economics at St. John's University, Queens, NY. She has published in the areas of political economy, public and urban economics, feminist theory, environmental economics, environmental sociology, and energy economics. The major theme of her research is the overlapping relationships between people, the economy, and nature, with a current emphasis on precarious work and Marxist-feminist critiques of household production and work outside the wage-relation. Her work has appeared in the *Review of Radical Political Economics*, *Science & Society*, *Energy Policy*, and *Energy Research & Social Science*. She earned a BA in Economics from Reed College, an MA in Economics from the University of Illinois at Chicago—where she was a graduate concentrator in Gender and Women's Studies—and a Ph.D. in Urban Studies from Portland State University. She has wide-ranging training in qualitative and quantitative methods, and both neoclassical and heterodox economics, as well as interdisciplinary expertise in sociology, gender studies, anthropology, and science and technology studies. She first joined URPE in 2008, and has been involved in left organizations for 25 years. Her editorial experience includes her membership in the Manuscript Review Collective for *Science & Society*, and service as a frequent referee of scholarly work in a variety of disciplines. She would love the opportunity to work with the scholars on the Editorial Board of the *Review of Radical Political Economics* to advance radical political economy and critical analyses of society as URPE enters its second half-century.

Susan Schroeder is originally from Rochester, NY and is Senior Lecturer at the Department of Political Economy at the University of Sydney, Australia. Prior to her move to Australia, Susan held academic and research positions in Germany, New Zealand, and the United States. Susan completed her Ph.D. in Economics at the Graduate Faculty at the New School for Social Research. She is member of the editorial advisory boards for the *Review of Radical Political Economics* (since 2014) and the *Review of Political Economy* (since 2013). Her training in alternative frameworks of macroeconomics, microeconomics, and history of economic thought has helped her to engage with researchers in the "broad church" that Political Economy encompasses. As such, Susan has been granted visiting scholar status at The School for Oriental and African Studies (University of London) and the JFK Institute (Berlin), and she is a lifetime member of Wolfson College, Cambridge University. She publishes on political economic methods, history of thought, business cycles, financial fragility and crises, and the ratings industry.
