For over forty years, the *Review of Radical Political Economics (RRPE)* has been a leading outlet for innovative research in non-orthodox economics. As the journal of the Union for Radical Political Economics, the *RRPE* promotes critical inquiry into all areas of economic, social, and political reality. The *RRPE* publishes innovative research in political economy broadly defined including, but not confined to, Marxian economics, post-Keynesian economics, Sraffian economics, feminist economics, and radical institutional economics. The *RRPE* reflects an interdisciplinary approach to the study, development, and application of radical political economic analysis to social problems.

The *RRPE* welcomes contributions in all areas of political economy and actively seeks submissions concerned with policy, history of thought, and economics and the environment.

The *RRPE* is published four times a year by Sage Publications.

Every year URPE sponsors a series of panels at the **Allied Social Sciences Associations** meetings, The **Eastern Economic Association** meetings, and the **Southern Economic Association** meetings to provide a venue for the presentation and discussion of current research in heterodox economics. In addition, each year the *RRPE* publishes a selection from the papers presented at the ASSA in a **"Proceedings Issue."**

URPE's presence at the ASSA started in the late 1960's as a result of protests at the business meeting of the Association when radical political economists demanded the space for heterodox economics in the program. URPE at the EEA and the SEA has also become a place for graduate students to present their work and receive critical feedback. Our programs at these scholarly conferences are critical to the advancement of our work and we encourage members to submit proposals for papers to be presented there.
