Every year URPE sponsors a series of panels at the Allied Social Sciences Associations meetings, The Eastern Economic Association meetings, and the Southern Economic Association meetings to provide a venue for the presentation and discussion of current research in heterodox economics. In addition, each year the RRPE publishes a selection from the papers presented at the ASSA in a "Proceedings Issue."

URPE's presence at the ASSA started in the late 1960's as a result of protests at the business meeting of the Association when radcial political economists demanded the space for heterodox economics in the program. URPE at the EEA and the SEA has also become a place for graduate students to present their work and recieve critical feedback. Our programs at these scholarly conferences are critical to the advancement of our work and we encourage members to submit proposals for papers to be presented there.
