CANDIDATE STATEMENTS

David Barkin is once again up for re-election to the *RRPE* Editorial Board. From his position in Mexico, serving on the Board seems the most practical way he can continue participating in the *RRPE*. He has many years of experience on the Board and hopes that he can continue contributing to the *RRPE*'s development, with a particular emphasis on giving voice to problems of the Global South. At present, he is committed to advancing the issue of climate change.

Jonathan Cogliano is Assistant Professor of Economics at the University of Massachusetts Boston. He holds a Ph.D. in economics from the New School for Social Research and a B.A. in economics from the University of Massachusetts Amherst. His research focuses on: classical and Marxian political economy, with a particular interest in value theory; theories of exploitation and class, including the relationship between exploitation and income and wealth inequality; computational simulation methods, especially agent-based modeling; and the history of economic thought, including classical and Marxian thinking as well as the more recent history of microeconomic theory. His work is published in *Cambridge Journal of Economics, Environment and Planning A: Economy and Space, Journal of Economic Surveys, Marxism21, Metroeconomica, Review of Political Economy, Review of Social Economy*, and on Edward Elgar. He is committed to fostering spaces for heterodox economics in the economics profession, and would be honored to serve as a member of the Editorial Board to support the mission of the *Review of Radical Political Economics* and to maintain this vibrant space for heterodox ideas and discourse.

Rishabh Kumar is Assistant Professor of Economics at The University of Massachusetts-Boston. He received his PhD in Economics from The New School for Social Research and an MA in Economics from Jawaharlal Nehru University. His research and writing focus on wealth distribution, poverty, and economic development. In ongoing work, he has attempted to test Marxist economic theory using modern empirical data at a global scale. Broadly speaking, he focuses on creating connections between the functional distribution of income and interpersonal income inequality. He is standing for the *RRPE* Editorial Board election for the first time. Previously, he has reviewed papers for a wide range of journals, ranging from *The Economic Journal, Journal of Economic Behavior and Organization, Journal of Post Keynesian Economics, Structural Change & Economic Dynamics*, and (of course) *RRPE*.

Thomas E. Lambert is Assistant Professor and teaches for the Economics and Equine Administration Departments at the University of Louisville. He has a BA in Political Science and an MBA from the University of Louisville, an MS in Economics from the University of Kentucky, and a PhD in Urban and Public Affairs from the University of Louisville. He has taught microeconomics, macroeconomics, urban economics, equine economics, statistics, public policy, research methods, and public administration over the years for the University of Louisville, Northern Kentucky University, and Indiana University Southeast. His research interests are in the areas heterodox and Marxian economics, horseracing and gambling studies, the political economy of local economic development, and economic history from radical political economy perspectives. His publications have appeared in journals such as *The Cambridge Journal of Economics, Journal of Post-Keynesian Economics, Public Finance Review, Economic Development Quarterly, Journal of Economic Issues, State and Local Government Review, Monthly Review, Review of Radical Political Economics, World Review of Political Economy, Forum for Social Economics, and Social Science Quarterly*, among others. He has been a reviewer for most of these journals, and his 2023 paper "The Great Resignation in the United States: A Study of Labor Market Segmentation," published in the *Forum of Social Economics (FSE)*, has been recognized with the 2023 Patrick Welch Best Paper Award for a publication in *FSE* by the Association for Social Economics (ASE). He is a member of the Union for Radical Political Economists, Association for Evolutionary Economics (AFEE), Association for Heterodox Economics (AHE), Association for Social Economics, World Association of Political Economy (WAPE), International Initiative for Promoting Political Economy (IIPE), and serves on the board of the Association for Institutionalist Thought (AFIT). He has presented at conference sessions for many of these organization. He is enthusiastically willing to review for *RRPE*, help with special issues, serving on subcommittees, attend and participate in meetings for the *RRPE* editorial board, and help the board to accomplish its mission of helping the journal to continue to be the best in radical political economy. In his spare time, and as time permits, he participates in the Louisville DSA chapter, hosts a local radio show/podcast for Forward Radio, 106.5 FM, in Louisville titled "Economic Impact" which focuses on economic topics from heterodox perspectives, and has testified at local and state level hearings on local "living wage" efforts, taxation, and gambling issues.

Gary Mongiovi is Professor of Economics at St John's University and an occasional Lecturer in Economics at the New School for Social Research. He received his PhD in Economics from the New School for Social Research in 1988. His main areas of research concern the classical political economy tradition associated with Ricardo, Marx, and Sraffa; the history of economic thought; and non-mainstream approaches in macroeconomics. His current research is focused on the ideological role that economics plays within capitalism, and on models of structural change. From 1996 to 2012 he co-edited the *Review of Political Economy* with Steve Pressman, and he served as its Book Review Editor until 2020. He has been a member of the Editorial Boards of the *RRPE*, the *Review of Keynesian Economics*, and *Research in the History of Economic Thought & Methodology*. His work has appeared in the *Cambridge Journal of Economics, Catalyst, Contributions to Political Economy, Critical Sociology, Social Research*, the *Journal of the History of Economic Thought, Metroeconomica, The Nation, the Review of Radical Political Economics, Research in the History of Economic Thought & Methodology*, and the *American Journal of Economics & Sociology*. He served on

URPE's Steering Committee in the 1990s and is currently on the SC's Finance subcommittee. He has been a member of the Editorial Board of the *RRPE* since 1994. He considers his work on the Board to be one of his most rewarding professional activities, a true labor of love, and he hopes to continue supporting the cause of radical political economics in this capacity for a while longer.

Keston K. Perry is Assistant Professor in the Department of African American Studies at the University of California, Los Angeles. He specializes in the political economy of Caribbean Development whose work examines the intersection of racial capitalism, climate justice, and global finance and governance. Utilizing a heterodox approach and subversive methods to unsettle ideological and colonialist premises of economic analyses and knowledge claims, his contribution builds upon the plantation economy school and Black Studies. This work advances political economic insights to build an emancipatory and reparative approach to social justice and collective liberation of marginalized communities facing the worst effects of socio-ecological injustices in the Caribbean. Having earned his Ph.D. at SOAS University of London in 2017, he has published widely in several academic journals including *Climate and Development*, *Social Science History*, *International Journal of Political Economy*, *Development and Change* and *Cambridge Journal of Economics*, among others. In 2021, he served as an Economic Affairs Officer and consultant at the Division of Globalization and Development Strategies of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD). Since 2022, he has served as an Associate Editor of the international academic journal *Geoforum*. He thus brings distinctive and diverse interdisciplinary insights and experiences to his role as an *RRPE* Editorial Board Member. He held previous academic appointments at Williams College, the University of the West of England, UK, and Tufts University.

Paddy Quick would like to continue to participate as a member of the Editorial Board in the valuable work of the *RRPE*. She also serves as a member of the URPE Steering Committee and is committed to ensuring that URPE as a whole continues to play a political role in contemporary struggles. This includes opposition to the active participation of the US in the Israeli genocide of the Palestinian people. Her theoretical work focuses on the non-wage-labor activity of women, men, and children in both capitalist and prior modes of production. She would like to see the *RRPE* include in its pages more attention to history not only post-1945, but in the preceding centuries. She is currently an Emerita Professor of Economics at St. Francis College, Brooklyn, USA, and holds a B.A. degree in philosophy, politics, economics from Oxford University (1967) and a Ph. D. in economics for Harvard University (1967). She regrets the time spent in the two latter institutions in the study of society from the perspective of the capitalist class, i.e., bourgeois ideology. She looks forward to continuing to work, within the *RRPE*, in the substitution of study from the perspective of the international working class.

Sara Stevano is a development and feminist political economist. She is Senior Lecturer in Economics at SOAS University of London, after holding teaching and research positions at the University of the West of England, Bristol, and King's College London. Her areas of study are the political economy of work, food and nutrition, social reproduction, and inequalities. Her work focuses on Africa, specifically Mozambique and Ghana. Sara coordinates the IIPPE Social Reproduction Working Group (with Hannah Bargawi and Serap Saritas) and the ANH Political Economy of Agri-Nutrition Working Group (with Fiorella Picchioni). Sara is Associate Editor for the *Review of Social Economy*. She has published in peer reviewed journals such as *Feminist Economics*, the *Cambridge Journal of Economics*, *Review of International Political Economy*, *World Development*, and the *Journal of Development Studies*. Sara is committed to expanding the boundaries of economic and political economy research and teaching through interdisciplinary approaches, qualitative methods, and micro-macro bridges. As a member of the *RRPE* Editorial Board, Sara would be particularly interested in working with others to strengthen the presence of feminist political economy, interdisciplinary, and Africa-focused research from a radical political economy lens in *RRPE*.

John Willoughby is currently Professor of Economics at American University. He has served on the *RRPE* editorial board in the past and would welcome the opportunity to do so again. John received his PhD from the University of California-Berkeley and also studied at the University of Michigan and the University of Cambridge. His initial work was a critical examination of Marxist theories of imperialism which led to the writing of a book entitled *Capitalist Imperialism, Crisis, and the State*. He later applied the theoretical framework he developed to a study of the American occupation of Germany in the early years after World War II and published a book entitled *Remaking the Conquering Heroes*. John has also worked and lived in Egypt and the United Arab Emirates and has co-authored a book with Fatima Badry entitled *Higher Education Revolutions in the Gulf*. In addition, he has published works on economic globalization, migration from South Asia to the Arabian Peninsula, and the economic causes and effects of the Arab Spring. He has co-authored works with Leann Roncolato and Abhilasha Srivastava which integrate feminist and Marxist theory to analyze women's informal employment in South Africa and the dynamics of caste and marriage in India. Both articles were published in the *RRPE*. John is currently writing about alternative models of socialism. He believes that the *RRPE* plays an indispensable role in promoting high-quality, inclusive work, and that *RRPE* should be open to the full variety of heterodox theoretical frameworks that critically analyze the present capitalist "order."

Mary V. Wrenn is currently Senior Lecturer in Economics at the University of the West of England. Her research interests center on studies of neoliberalism, including locating ontological concepts such as agency, identity, and emotions therein. She has served the broader heterodox community through organizations such as AFEE, AFIT, and ASE by serving as an officer in the former two and board member in the latter. She also serves on the editorial boards of *Journal of Economic Issues* and *Panoeconomicus*. Mary has enjoyed her time on the *RRPE* editorial board and would be honored to continue serving. Collaborating with the reviewers and authors has been an enriching experience, and these conversations prove to be a reminder to her of what academia could be.
